What is Academic Writing?

- Analytical concerned with real facts, not assumptions
- Objective based on things that can be measured, rather than on feelings
- Intellectual based on informed judgment of information
- Rational decisions and judgments based on reason instead of passion

6 Key Steps for Writing a Paper

- 1 Understanding the requirements
 - 2 Knowing the paper's purpose
 - 3 Choosing a topic
 - 4 Researching
 - 5 Structuring the paper
- 6 Editing the paper



- Read the instruction sheet for the assignment carefully
- Make sure you UNDERSTAND the type of paper you are to write
- Ensure you meet all the parameters outlined in the assignment
- Ask yourself how this assignment fits into the big picture of your program (Why did it get assigned?)

2. What is the Purpose of the Paper?

- Analytical / Critical
- Argumentative/Persuasive
- Compare and/or Contrast
- Process
- Classification
- Research


3. The Topic

- May be assigned
- If you have an option to choose, select a topic that is familiar
- Remember the topic is the GENERAL idea
- Based on the topic, you form the thesis



Brainstorm


Who? What? Where? When? Why? How?



What is the thesis?

- The point of your essay
- It is specific and detailed
- The thesis must leave no question with the reader as to what your intentions are

Topic + Opinion = Thesis



A thesis states the most important idea you want to prove as a result of your reading, thinking, research, and writing.

I want to show/prove/claim/argue/demonstrate/that:

-"Xxx xxxxxx xx xxxx xxx xxxxxxx Xxxxxx xxxx xxxxx xxxx xxx." Main claim that the rest of your paper supports

A good point doesn't usually happen first, but comes out of brainstorming, readings, and research.

Developing the Thesis

Weak Thesis:

The Roman Empire did not last forever.

Weak Thesis:

Oral hygiene is important for your health.

Stronger Thesis:

Due to military decay, the fall of Rome was inevitable.

Stronger Thesis:

Practicing oral hygiene, including regular visits to a dentist, proper brushing and flossing, and healthy eating, can help you to prevent serious health problems.

4. Researching

- Make sure your sources are QUALITY sources:
 - Check university and college libraries and virtual libraries http://www.fanshawec.ca/EN/
 - Try typing "journal articles" as part of your search criteria
 - Use Google Scholar
 - No Wikipedia, blogs, etc. ... if there is no author and date, you may want to reconsider the source
- Avoid plagiarism –document your sources!
 - Use MLA or APA

5. Essay Structure

Basic paper components:

Introduction

- Starts with an interesting statement related to the topic
- Maps out your essay
- Ends with the thesis statement that includes sub-points

Body

 Body paragraphs support your thesis, at least one paragraph for each sub point of your thesis

Conclusion

- Rewords the thesis to provide consideration of the impact
- Shows the significance of the sub-points
- Leaves an impression, something to ponder, a final thought

Essay/paper structure

Introduction

Narrow down, or "funnel" to your point

Body Paragraph #1

Each paragraph addresses one main point in support of your thesis

Paragraph #2


Paragraph #3

Interesting statement
The map to your essay

Thesis statement – this is the whole point of the essay!

Conclusion

What's the significance?




Reworked thesis statement

Interesting statement or inspiring thought



- Does the essay do what the assignment asked you to do?
- Are the language and content appropriate for the audience?
- Could the essay be strengthened by the inclusion of more concrete details?
- Are the sentences and paragraphs properly structured?
- Is the grammar and spelling correct?
- Have you followed APA or MLA guidelines?

Other Tips to Remember



I luck foreword to speak with u on per son. I wood bee a ben a fit too your come pony.

Avoid the Following:

- Libel slander
- Hyperboles an exaggeration or an overstatement
- Colloquialisms informal expressions often considered as slang, idioms, etc.
- Personalization In a formal scholarly paper, using "I" or "You" is typically bad form...HOWEVER – using "I" is usually considered acceptable if the paper requires direct reflection from you.
- Anthropomorphisms Giving human qualities to nonhuman objects

Transitions

- Make sure your writing flows
- Use transition words or phrases
- Connect ideas within your paragraph
- Connect ideas from one paragraph to another
- Keep a list of transition words handy to help you with variety

i.e. however, consequently, moreover, additionally, furthermore, as well, finally, etc.)



Finally,

Edit! Edit! Edit!

- Your first draft is never the one you hand in.
- Read your essay out loud to listen for errors.

First Draft: Focus on structure and organization

Second Draft: Focus on logic and clarity (remove the lard)

Third Draft: Focus on grammar and language

Fourth Draft: Final proofreading for overall professional look

- Make sure your facts are correct.
- For statistical research/data, make sure it is recent.
- Common errors:
 - Run-ons, comma splices
 - Pronoun references
 - Verb tenses
 - Punctuation
