College Policy Manual changes for November 2, 2022

A109: Incidental Cancellation of Classes

Amended (Oct. 10, 2022)

This policy has been substantially changed to modernize the response and management of incidental class cancellations. Major changes include:

- suggestion of FOL as the main notification method of class cancellations;
- establishment of alternative class cancellation notices that may be defined at the school level; and
- requirement for Academic Managers to ensure that class and/or program learning outcomes be achieved when an incidental class cancellation occurs.

TOR27: Program Advisory Committees – Standard 1 School Guide for Program Advisory Committees

Amended (Oct. 10, 2022)

Only Standard 1 of these terms of reference was edited. Edits were made to keep the School Guide for Program Advisory Committee up to date with current practices for PAC meetings that align with changes to policy A126: Program Excellence and Ministry Binding Policy Directives.



COLLEGE POLICY CHANGES

College Policy Manual changes for November 14, 2022

C104: Standard 1: Meal Reimbursement Amounts in Canada and U.S.A (policy C104: Expense Reimbursement)

Effective: October 1, 2022

Amended (Nov. 2, 2022)

Standard 1 of policy C104 was updated to reflect increased meal reimbursement amounts effective October 1, 2022.

P104: Standard 1: Principles for Reporting and Responding (policy P104: Sexual Violence and Sexual Assault)

Effective: September 22, 2022

Amended (Sep. 22, 2022, BOG #596)

The College Sexual Violence and Sexual Assault Policy (P104) is reviewed every three years by the Board of Governors. The Policy was reviewed at the September 2022 Board meeting and approved with three changes. Section 3 was revised to reflect that coaching and training staff who work with athletes are included as positions of authority with respect to the issue of consent. Recommended to all colleges by the Ministry of Colleges and Universities, sections 5.1 and 6. were modified to reflect that: students who make a good faith complaint about sexual violence are not subject to discipline or sanctions under college policies related to drug or alcohol use at the time of the occurrence; and, students reporting an incident will not be asked irrelevant questions during the investigations process, including questions relating to sexual expression or past sexual history.
